See Article History. Multiple intelligences, theory of human intelligence first proposed by the psychologist Howard Gardner in his book *Frames of Mind* (1983). At its core, it is the proposition that individuals have the potential to develop a combination of eight separate intelligences, or spheres of intelligence; that proposition is grounded on Gardner's assertion that an individual's cognitive capacity cannot be represented adequately in a single measurement, such as an IQ score.

Multiple Intelligences. The theory of multiple intelligences was developed in 1983 by Dr. Howard Gardner, professor of education at Harvard University. It suggests that the traditional notion of intelligence, based on I.Q. testing, is far too limited. Instead, Dr. Gardner proposes eight different intelligences to account for a broader range of human potential in children and adults.

The Howard Gardner 9 Multiple Intelligences system is the inspiration for what we are now calling simply "Multiple Intelligences" or "Multi-Intelligence" for short. The Gardner 9 Intelligences differentiate intelligence into 9 specific (primarily sensory) "modalities" rather than seeing it as dominated by a single general ability. The 9 types of intelligence are: Naturalist Intelligence ("Nature Smart"), Musical Intelligence ("Musical Smart"), Logical-Mathematical ...
